They started work on the first two classrooms, office, staff room and store last weekend and are making really good progress - this was taken on Saturday afternoon and they are nearly at wall height and have started to fit the baluster windows in the two classrooms. Due to the rapid increase in the price of items on the market, we have already purchased and stored ALL the building materials in the village.



Despite the sharp rise in building materials, all the funding is in place to complete this first phase of the project and we are still hopeful that the first phase will be completed ahead of the rainy season, which usually starts in May. This may mean that for an interim period they may have to operate a “two shift” system, with half the pupils attending in the morning and the remainder attending in the afternoon – not an ideal situation but the best we can manage.

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The guys are busy making blocks, block mould just above the head of the guy centre front. **NOTE** - all are barefoot!!
